Ideas for speakers' topics, mini-sessions, and 4th-Friday classes were phenomenal, and will keep us busy for the foreseeable future! Members reported learning about SOCCGS from flyers at the Reader's Festival, from other genealogy groups, and other libraries and archives, including the Family History Center and NARA. Be sure to keep an extra brochure with you (at all times ☺) to pass along to a friend - that was the #1 way people learned about us!

Some of the questions you asked:

- **Is the monthly calendar on our website?** Yes! To find our web site, Google "SOCCGS", and our web page is the first result. Scroll down to "Coming Events", and click on the calendar link. Double-check with the organizer of an event to make sure nothing changes. Our Facebook page is another great way to keep up to date. Go to Google and search for "Facebook South Orange County" – we are the first result and you do not have to be logged in with a Facebook account to see the page.
- **What is the brick wall section of the monthly meeting all about?** This is an interactive section of the monthly meeting, when members can share some aspect of their research about which they are feeling stuck or "brickwalled". Other people can then offer hints about resources to check and approaches to take to get around the seeming barrier. with the group. You never know who might help, and how that breakthrough will come.
- **I use Heritage Quest at home with my library card from Carlsbad. Can we get access to Ancestry from home in a similar manner?** No, The Mission Viejo Library cannot license Ancestry that way. Ancestry Library Edition is limited to use in the library. Mission Viejo Library Computers, SOCCGS computers and patron computers can only use Ancestry when connected in the library.
- **I am not too familiar with what there is at the Library. Will there be another Open House?** Yes, probably in June. Check Facebook, the Calendar, or the Newsletter for the date.
- **Will you upgrade the old computers at the library?** Yes! It is already in the procurement process.
- **Is it possible for SOCCGS to have a library card to access databases at other libraries?** No, Library cards are issued to individuals, not to organizations. Take advantage of the Safari trips to Carlsbad and Los Angeles, and get a free library card there when you go!
- **What are the Fourth Friday classes?** Fourth Friday classes are new! In late 2013, the Society decided to offer a variety of classes in addition to the monthly meetings, to be held at a regular time and day each month – the fourth Friday. These provide in-depth training and education on a range of topics, from databases to research techniques, and other family history-related activities. The Mission Viejo library is closed on Friday mornings, so we have the genealogy area to ourselves for the classes. Most classes begin at 10 a.m., and we gather early by the front door of the library to escorted through the library right at 10 am. Cousins, Cousins, Everywhere!

Sheila writes:

I was doing some research on Ancestry.com a couple of weeks ago and got a notification that a member had posted a document relating to a common ancestor. When I opened it up, it said, that Barbara Taylor had posted the document. I thought, wouldn't that be a coincidence if it were the same Barbara Taylor that is in our group. I sent her a message, asking if she was BarbaraTaylor7777, and she responded, "Are we cousins?" Turns out, we are!

I am a first cousin six times removed from Loammi Baldwin, Revolutionary War patriot. **Loammi Baldwin (Sr) (1744 - 1807)**, born and died in Woburn, MA, was called "the father of civil engineering" and with his sons, built the Middlesex Canal near Boston as well as forts to protect the city from the British. Their home, originally built in 1660 and expanded in the 1800s, still stands in Woburn, Massachusetts.

Barbara writes:

Loammi's first wife was **Mary Fowle (1747-1786)**, daughter of **James Fowle (1720-1793)** and **Mary Reed (1726-1790)**; Mary was my first cousin five times removed. Loammi's second wife was **Margery Fowle (1767-1799)**, daughter of **Josiah Fowle (1731-1805)** and **Margery Carter (1730-1812)**; Margery Fowle was my third great grand aunt. Mary and Margery were first cousins. Loammi, both wives and all their parents were born and died in Woburn, Massachusetts. Both Mary and Margery Fowle are descended from **George Fowle (1610 - 1682)** who came from England to Massachusetts about 1638.

I attended my first SOCCGS meeting after I contacted someone on Ancestry.com about an ancestor shortly after I moved back to California in 2011. It turned out that former member **Tom Corning** is my eighth cousin once removed and we share many ancestors from Massachusetts.

I was researching my ex-husband's grandparents in North Carolina, trying to find out their relationship to the person who married him, Felix Absher. I sent a message to a woman who had Felix in her family tree and it turned out she lived in Orange County, California. We had lunch and got to be friends, so I invited her to join our group. That is my distant cousin by marriage - member **Arlene O'Donnell**.

When I did DNA on FamilyTreeDNA last summer, I recognized one person's email address on a match -- our own librarian **Bunny Smith**. Bunny's husband **Leon Smith** and I are cousins, though we have not yet figured out who our common ancestors are.

At the December 2013 holiday meeting, I won the door prize - a book called "Matilda's Story: The California Years" by our member **Jacquelyn Hansen**. As I was reading the introduction, she thanked **Robert Hoadley** for his help on one part of the family. Robert is related to the son of Jacquelyn's great grandmother and Robert is also my cousin, discovered via DNA. We share at least four ancestors with Robert's mother - three of them known on my side from Massachusetts and one or more on my ex-husband's side, yet undiscovered.

When **Jack Naylor**, our membership chairperson, says, "You may meet a cousin in our group." He is not kidding!!

"My Story" begins in a small Northwest Iowa town during the Great Depression. My parents, Fae Minor and George Emerick, were barely 21 years of age when I was born. The depression years were not kind to this young married couple. I was born at the home of my maternal grandparents, Mabel Sheldon and Cassius Minor. In 1936 my mother and I were living in a "sleeping room" above the pool hall while my dad was living and working at a CCC Camp.

Mostly, small town life was good to me. Two sets of grandparents and great grandparents lived and died there. I was the third generation of my family to graduate from Milford High School.

After college, with my husband, Bob (Some of you know him as the SOCCGS' cook and baker.) I lived in South Dakota and Colorado before locating in California. Two children and five grand children later the genealogy allure got me.

I joined SOCCGS in 1997 and began searching for a Revolutionary War ancestor so I could join the DAR. Little did I know that genealogy would take over my life. Finding one RW soldier led to five as well as

four who participated in the Civil War. Should you be interested, my family information can be found at Ancestry.com. Search "Cassius Blake Minor."

As a SOCCGS member I have served as president, vice president, newsletter editor and currently as treasurer. Some of the nicest people and friends I have met are my fellow genealogists.

SOCCGS Historian-Parliamentarian

Once in awhile a person gets to wear two hats in an organization; that is my claim to fame. I am currently the SOCCGS Historian (digital camera user and maintainer of the scrapbook) as well as the Parliamentarian (with Robert's Rules of Order-Revised and bell-ringer at refreshment time at general membership meetings), both at the ready.

However, personally, I revel in the opportunity of being my family's self-appointed family historian. All kinds of things get dumped on me in the name of historical significance. Doesn't matter; I accept them all ... my house is now a museum of sorts ... the artifacts does entertain the grandkids each time they come for a visit and on occasion I get to talk about the good old days to anyone who will listen.

Born in Cincinnati, Hamilton County, Ohio in 1932, I enjoyed the years there with my two younger sisters **Barbara** and **Nancy** (who are still living). We were so close in age (three babies in 42 months) that our mother said it was like "raising two sets of twins" ... new math. In 1939 our family moved to Columbus, Franklin County, Ohio. Our father, **John William Roy Dean**, was a petroleum engineer and a supervisor of acquisitions with Standard Oil of Ohio. Columbus was a more demanding area of growth and suited our dad's organizational talents.

With the onset of World War II in 1941, the draft started taking so many eligible men that every facet of the oil industry was drained of trained personnel. Our father was deferred from the draft because of his skills in the oil industry and his ability to fill in for those called up to serve.

Our mother, **Rebecca Irene Shultz Dean**, was a stay-at-home mom who donated her services to the Red Cross and other related causes directed toward the war effort. We had a Victory garden, she taught others how to do them (her father was a farmer); mother had a knack for organizing benefits and was able to sell hundreds of dollars, possibly thousands in Savings Bonds.

Eventually, mother, my sisters and I relocated to Phoenix, Arizona in 1943. Officially it was for reasons of mother's health; unofficially it was because my parents decided to separate and eventually divorced.

It is said that a person changes professions every ten years. I guess you could say that for me as well: I have been in the entertainment field; worked in publishing newspapers; secretary/typist in an engineering office; active as a paralegal and office administrator in the law field; and most rewarding of all as a wife (married over 50 years) and mother of seven ... foster mother to five others.

Now that I am a widow and the children are all married and gone, I volunteer in the community; am more active in my church; and revel in the time that I have in which to do genealogical research. The twenty-nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren in my life make historical events all the time.
